
The so-called 'Sprizzbar' where I have played many rapid games against Ruud Martin.


The room can be divided into two parts by a separation wall...



It looks a bit 'dark and dull' now without use...




But I can assure you that this room has a lot of potential for organising a computer chess tournament here!



Wolfgang does most of the testing and Ruud therefore gets a lot of feedback from him. The development of a new innovative top-class chess computer with many program versions takes a lot of time and energy. I have already been allowed to test the new chess computer a little. Pictures of it have been taken, but they cannot be made public yet. If everything goes according to plan, the new computer should be ready somewhere in the spring or summer of 2022...

Our way back home...

We Dutch people ask ourselves every year why we are so crazy to travel approx. 1500 kilometres for one weekend? It must be in our genes, otherwise we wouldn't do it!



On returning home to Tilburg my Cupra Ateca gave the following data:

Distance driven from Kaufbeuren to Tilburg: 768 km.

Driving time: 8 hours and 5 minutes.

Average speed per hour including breaks: 95 km.

Average consumption: 13,3 litres per 100 kilometres driven.

That's about 1 litre per 7,5 kilometres. A small vortex in the tank, then. But then again, with speeds often exceeding 200 kilometres per hour, this is to be expected. I paid the most expensive petrol ever at a Shell petrol station along the German A3 motorway near Cologne. For a litre of V-power Racing (octane number 100) I paid € 2.31...(!)

I spent about \in 400,-- on fuel alone on the way there and back. As everyone knows, fuel is very expensive at the moment. But not only that, I almost always tank premium petrol for my four-wheel-drive car. Fortunately, I can share these costs with my passengers...

Ruud Martin drove a rented 3-series BMW this time. As he said later, he came home broken. That had to do with the fact that he was missing some driving aids that he normally has in his own Mercedes. I hope for Ruud's sake that next time he will not get his car broken. I do not wish this on anyone, because it can ruin such a nice weekend...
